Christopher King

Christopher is currently Chief Executive of IAPS, a post he took up in September 2018.

Prior to that, Christopher was Headmaster and Chief Executive of Leicester Grammar School Trust (2001 - 2018). He was Chairman of HMC 2015 - 16 and unusually again in 2017 - 18. HMC is the association of the leading independent senior schools in the UK. Prior to this, he was Chairman of the HMC Professional Development Committee from 2009 to 2014 and HMC Full Board member from 2006 to 2018.

Sharing Practice and Perspective | Innovative Leadership

Innovation leadership is a philosophy and technique that combines different leadership styles to influence employees to produce creative ideas, products, and services. The key role in the practice of innovation leadership is the innovation leader.

In this panel discussion we will:

- Present contextualised case studies of innovative leadership;
- Discover the enablers and barriers to leading change as international school leaders;
- Explore the dissonance between 'the aspiration and the execution' of innovative leadership (McKinsey);
- Identify the characteristics of a successful change agent;

- Reflect on to ensure that change is institutionalised, as the majority of change projects fail at initiation or implementation stage;

Ben Hunt-Davis

Ben Hunt-Davis rowed for Great Britain at the 1992 Barcelona Olympic Games and the 1996 Atlanta Olympic Games winning a silver medal in the 1999 World Rowing Championships. Ben was part of the GB Men's VIII's who won gold at the 2000 Summer Olympics in Sydney, the first British crew to have won this event since 1912.

Ben later co-wrote the book 'Will It Make
The Boat Go Faster?' with Executive Coach
- Harriet Beveridge - to show you how to use
specific strategies to improve performance in
business, and life.

Ben is a keynote speaker and performance coach and owns a leadership development company, Will It Make The Boat Go Faster? Ltd with Tom Barry. Ben has also worked for the British Olympic Association, was the Chairman of the 2011 World Rowing Junior Championships and is Chairman of the Organising Committee for the 2013 World Rowing Cup at Eton Dorney.

Session 4 - Keynote

Performance Excellence: Will It Make The Boat Go Faster?

In 1998, following another disappointing Rowing World Championships, Ben Hunt-Davis and the rest of his GB Eight rowing team realised that if they carried on doing what they were doing, they would keep getting what they'd been getting – which was a lot of 7th place finishes!

So instead, they decided to approach things differently, critically, asking the same simple question with every decision and action they took: 'Will it make the boat go faster?'.

Along their journey they learned the sustainable, dependable techniques that put them on track for their gold medal at the Sydney Olympics in 2000.


Ben's inspirational story is not only motivational, but practical and applicable to organisations around the world. The story is one of a group of individuals forged into a winning team by following a set of Performance Principles, habitually and consistently, in everything they did:

- 1. Focus on what's important
- 2. Focus on performance, in order to get results
- 3. Work together effectively

Session 5 - Workshop

Better Yet: Maintaining Momentum for Performance Excellence

In his Keynote speech, Ben tells the story of how the GB Men's Eight rowing team changed as a crew from being regularly 7th to winning Olympic Gold. The simplicity of the question "Will It Make The Boat Go Faster?" and its implied focus and action consistently resonates with teams and individuals who are challenged to lead themselves and others to simplify processes, reduce complexity, innovate and improve performance. In the followon workshop Ben will support delegates to translate some of those high performance principles into daily practice.

Simon is a qualified leadership trainer who provides bespoke programmes covering all aspects of crisis management, student welfare and well-being in schools. His work includes ing in schools. His work includes coaching school leaders, developing bespoke programmes for individual schools and working with school leadership teams.

Session 6 - Keynote

From Crisis to Well-being - A Leadership Experience

The deepening understanding of cognitive science, the growth of positive psychology and the recognition of the importance of well-being in schools is offering us a pathway to both better support students to experience a fulfilling life and to increase their potential to flourish academically and personally. The science is showing us that a student with strong levels of well-being learns better and enjoys the journey far more. Additionally, well-being supports the development of resilience and the ability to cope with change. This is equally true for leaders and all other members of our community who engage in developing their well-being.

Simon relates the story of coping with an extreme crisis that became both personal and professional and how the experience moved both him and the school to change how they worked and what they believed was important. Simon will use this case study to explore what we can do as school leaders to help ourselves prepare for and cope with difficulties and the direct benefit this can have on us personally and for our schools.

Session 7 - Workshop

Solution-based Coaching to Enhance Wellbeing of Leaders

As a follow-up to the keynote, Simon will look at research on leadership and review regular routines. He will focus on identifying easily manageable change that promotes well-being. This session will be highly interactive and personally rewarding. It will utilise Solution Focused Coaching techniques to identify short term, easy to implement, personal goals that will begin the process of positive change in our schools.

Positive Education

This year Dubai College, known for the strength of the students' academic results, has set off in an unexpected direction by launching its own bespoke Positive Education programme. Based upon the work of Martin Seligman, the father of positive psychology, the school enlisted the help of Geelong Grammar School (GGS) in Victoria State, Australia, to start them on their journey.

Mark and Sheridan will provide the context for this programme and run delegates through some of the interventions which students will undertake, the research which underpins their impact.

Session 9

Lessons from the Mental Health Awards

It will include the latest research, case studies from the UAE and the UK, and will share best practice whilst signposting resources, partnerships and collaborations to drive forward this agenda.

Sir John Jones

Sir John is one of a small, select band of educational professionals who have not only had their achievements recognised in the New Year's Honours List (2003), but have been able to inspire others with their knowledge and passion.

As headteacher of three secondary schools over a period of 17 years, Sir John was asked to join the Government's Policy Action Team for Neighbourhood Renewal at the Social Exclusion Unit. He was also a member of the Headteachers' National Focus Group on Truancy and Exclusion and the Excellence in Cities Project at the DfE. He was part of the National Remodelling Team and the Leadership and Development Unit sponsored by the National College for School Leadership. Working part-time at the Centre for Educational Leadership at Manchester University, he designed and delivered a Master's Course at Liverpool University focused on the Leadership of Change.

Sir John has written two books; 'Truancy and Exclusion: A Teacher's Guide' and the best-selling 'The Magic-Weaving Business' and has co-authored 'Winning the H Factor: the Secrets of Happy Schools'.

#EachforEqual: Enabling Leadership Practices

The UN's theme for International Women's Day 2020 explores how we can enable equality.

The McKinsey 2019 Women in the Workplace Report highlights that although incremental progress is cited in organisations, it will still take 200 years to achieve full equality. In addition, a new gap has been identified: The Commitment Gap; the space between individual and collection intention and action.

#EachForEqual encourages us all to champion each other, to advocate the gaps for under-represented groups and invites us to be allies.

This session, hosted by Hannah Wilson, Co-Founder of #womened (a global grassroots movement for gender equality in the education system), will include 4 micro presentations from BSME leaders who will share personal and professional stories which will encourage reflection, provoke discussion and call you to action.

Their stories of authenticity, vulnerability and resilience will inspire and empower the audience.
